You are invited to submit abstracts for oral or poster presentations.

Instructions for Oral Presentation and Poster Abstracts:

In Microsoft Word format:

- 1) Type the title in capital letters and bold font.
- 2) List all authors in capitals using first and last names, followed by their affiliation, address, and contact information in standard letters.
- 3) Abstracts are restricted to 250 words and should summarize findings. Please identify whether the abstract is for an oral presentation or poster presentation immediately after the abstract

Book Review

Desert Bighorn Sheep – Wilderness Icon by Mark C. Jorgensen

I was offered the opportunity to review a new book about wild sheep, *Desert Bighorn Sheep – Wilderness Icon* by Mark C. Jorgensen, with photographs by Jeff Young. This 143-page book is being published by Sunbelt Publications (sunbeltpub.com) and lists for \$29.95. Rather than produce a few lines in praise of this most informative book, I instead recorded the thoughts of others who work with desert bighorn sheep. Farewell to Pete Sanchez

Pete Sanchez passed away last fall in Glenwood Springs, New Mexico. Pete was a long time Park Naturalist in Death Valley. Pete was the Secretary/Treasurer of the DBC in the early 1980's (while he was simultaneously the Secretary/Treasurer for the Desert Pupfish Council). He was responsible for bringing the feral burro population of Death Valley National Monument to ZERO, with help from one of the early BLM burro gather contractors. Pete did some experimental work with Salt Cedar at Death Valley, and determined that a medium sized Salt Cedar (not the *Athol* variety) could pump as much as 250 gallons per day from the ground surface. This figure is used today to justify guzzler construction in northern Nevada, as Salt Cedar invaded many dry washes there in the 1970's.
